

CAMELLIA CULTURE

With Royce Rhoads

The 3 P's for gardening is planning, preparation, and planting. Last month we discussed planning and right on cue El Nino arrived just in time for planting our camellias, if you haven't done so already. If you haven't, this month we will prepare for planting.

Camellias can be planted in any month, although spring and fall is the most common. When planting in the spring, plant after the fear of frost is over. When planting in the fall, you take advantage of the great growing conditions with the rain and the cool environment.



Preparation: SOIL

To check your soil type pick up a handful of moist soil, form it into a ball and drop it. If the ball of soil falls



apart when it hits the ground, it's sandy. If the soil ball feels like modeling clay and hold together after it hits the ground, it's clay. Continuing, if the soil ball breaks into a few crumbly chunks when it hits the ground, it's loam.

<u>DRAINAGE:</u>

A simple test can tell you how well your soil drains. Dig an 18 inch- deep hole and fill it with water during dry weather. Let it drain. Then fill the hole again. If the hole does not drain within 2 hours of this second filling, you have a drainage problem. To help the

drainage problem you should loosen the soil at the bottom with a garden claw or hoe. You can improve all soil types by adding compost, peat moss or humus to the soil before planting. This provides additional nutrients to the soil as they break down, feeding the camellia's root system. If the pH of the soil is a concern (camellias like 5.5-6.0 range) you can test the pH of your soil with an inexpensive pH meter available from your local garden centers.

Planting:

After you have corrected the soil and drainage problems you are now ready to plant.

- Dig a hole that is 1 to 2 inches shorter than the length of the root ball and twice the diameter of the container. The center of the hole should be higher than the sides that are slightly sloping.
- Place the camellia bush in the center of the hole; the top of the root ball should slightly protrude out of the rim of
 the hole. Fill in the hole with your enriched soil until the root ball is completely covered. Mound the soil
 over the top of the root ball and press down gently but firmly to stabilize the plant.
- Create a circular berm of dirt 2 to 3 feet away from the bush; press down firmly so the dirt will not wash away easily; the ridge helps contain water.
- Water the soil thoroughly but do not leave the camellia plant standing in
 water. Keepit watered regularly until roots are established and the plant
 shows signs of growth. After that soak the plant once a week to encourage
 deeper root growth, as camellia roots tend to stay toward the surface.
- Mulch around the camellia plant to retain moisture and even out the soil temperature. Mulch also suppresses weeds.

<u>Fertilize:</u>

Fertilize about 3 times per year with a balanced acid loving plant fertilizer. It has been recommended to use Cottonseed Meal to fertilize the camellia plants in early stages to avoid damage to the plant.

PS FROM THE TO

1. Don't judge your blooms in the back yard.. .take them to the show.

2. GET READY

- A. Start your bloom entry plan the week before the show.
- B. Pin back leaves with clothes pins, disbud and prune if necessary.
- C. Move container plants to protected area.
- D. Read show schedule.
- E. Clean boxes and get tools (brushes, tweezers, cotton etc.) ready.

3. CUTTING/HANDLING BLOOMS

- A. Remove leaves next to bloom from plant.
- B. Get cup/perlite/sand and preservative ready-use correct cup size.
- C. Put bloom in preservative within 8 seconds of cutting.
- D. Put bloom in container surrounded by cotton, etc.-no newspaper or Easter grass.
- E. Do not clean bloom until you get to the show.
- F. Clean leaves with milk/cream/mayonnaise (don't leave TOO shiny). Put leaves in separate bag.

4. EXHIBITING TIPS

- A. Walk the show~~~See what the competition is. Decide to enter single, tray, etc.
- B. Gather up necessary trays.
- C. Clean off bloom.
- D. Put out entry card-place bloom & cup on so only bloom name shows.
- E. Slide leaf under damaged petal IF flower is red~-white/pink nope.
- F. Put damaged blooms in rear of class.
- G. If your bloom is BEST, put next to next best bloom.
- H. If your bloom is next best, put far away from best bloom.
- I. Tilt the bloom slightly so it smiles at the judges.
- J. If bloom not fully open, push with cotton, Q-tip, blow on to fully open.
- K. Use cotton, tissue, etc. to stage bloom.
- L. Place bloom in middle of the table if few entries.
- M. Stage every bloom as if it is the ONLY one you have.
- N. When finished, go over show again to review competition/single or tray entry... also collections.

5. OUT OF TOWN TRIPS

- A. Gas/oil/clean windows, etc. a couple of days before show.
- B. Don't drive in the slow, bumpy, truck lane.
- C. Bring heavy coat in winter....DO NOT TURN ON THE HEATER.
